

Someone You Should Know: José Garcia

José García was born in Cuba emigrating to the United States when he was 12 years old. Dr. García has a well-defined

sense of justice and a fervent desire to do his part to create a better world for his children and ours. José's family's experiences in communist Cuba give him a unique perspective on oppression and inequality.

José went to school in his adopted city of Chicago attending Senn High School and Northeastern University. After a year of casework at Catholic Charities, he traveled to the Dominican Republic to attend medical school. His childhood dream was to become a pediatrician. After he returned to Chicago, he began his career at DCFS in 1993. Faced with difficulties related to immigration, a medical degree from a foreign country and the need to earn a living José decided to remain at DCFS where he could continue to help children and support his family.

José obtained a master's degree in social work from Dominican University and has served as a Clinical Services Coordinator for the last eight years. José and his wife Julia became foster parents after having two children of their own. His eldest Jaison works in marketing while his daughter Jennifer has just earned her own MSW.

While en route to a Child and Family Team Meeting with a caseworker, José was facilitating those meetings at the time, they stopped for a foster home visit. José began to play with a baby who was 4 months old at the time. The caseworker noticed and said, "Jose, you are a foster parent. This baby needs a foster home." So, José and Julia began to foster little Janet. Janet won their hearts and was adopted by José and Julia and their fostering days came to an end. Today Janet is 23 years old and is also following in her father's footsteps having earned her bachelor's degree in social work. That side trip to visit a foster home is José's fondest memory of all his years at DCFS,

José's advice to new caseworkers is to be resilient and patient. Be an advocate for children, families and all those who are less fortunate.
